ENSEÑA Y ACTÚA

Para muchos Jesús es un profeta, pero otros reconocen que es un profeta que actúa y habla diferente, que tiene autoridad, simplicidad, habla con todos y no tiene miedo a nada ni a nadie. Su mesianismo es algo diferente y ellos lo comentan. Jesús Decide acudir el sábado a la sinagoga "a enseñar". Se quedaron asombrados porque "enseñaba con autoridad y no como los letrados". Una vez más, se muestra que Jesús era un maestro atípico. El domingo pasado veíamos como, al contrario de lo que hacían los maestros de la ley, es El quien escoge a sus discípulos entre la gente sencilla. Ahora observamos que no se limita a repetir lo que han dicho otros rabinos anteriores. Habla con autoridad, porque confirma con sus hechos lo que pronuncian sus labios. Coherencia de vida es lo que debemos ofrecer los cristianos si queremos ser auténticos testigos de la Buena Noticia, pues "vale más un buen ejemplo que mil palabras". Muchos verán en Jesús el profeta prometido por Moisés, y algo más que profeta...

El profeta verdadero anuncia y denuncia. En el libro del Deuteronomio Moisés anuncia al pueblo que el Señor suscitará un profeta, haciendo caso a la petición del pueblo en la asamblea del Horeb. En él escucharán la voz de Dios. El profeta transmitirá la Palabra de Dios, es un intermediario entre Dios y los hombres. El profeta no hablará por sí mismo, el propio Yahvé pondrá las palabras en sus labios. Hay en el texto una doble advertencia: en primer lugar contra aquellos que no quieren escuchar a los auténticos profetas, en segundo lugar contra los falsos profetas que se anuncian a sí mismos, o que "dicen palabras que yo no les he mandado". Clara alusión ésta a aquellos que se autoproclaman profetas y engañan al pueblo, señalando que la salvación está en la alianza con Egipto o Babilonia, El profeta verdadero anuncia y denuncia, con el riesgo de no ser escuchado e incluso estará expuesto a la persecución, cuando avisa que la auténtica salvación viene de la conversión del corazón. Hoy día, vivimos inundados de palabras. Cada mañana nos despertamos con las palabras que oímos en la radio o en la televisión, palabras que leemos en los periódicos. Palabras, palabras, palabras Sufrimos una auténtica "inflación verbal". No se valora la palabra como antes; cuando alguien decía "te doy mi palabra" sabíamos que podíamos fiarnos de esa persona.

Hay muchos pregoneros de discursos fáciles o aprendidos, pero faltan los auténticos testigos. ¿Dónde están los profetas? Por sus hechos les conoceréis... El seguidor de Jesús sabe que muchas veces no será escuchado, incluso será puesto en ridículo o perseguido por ser coherente con su fe. Cuentan que un cristiano acudía todos los días a proclamar su mensaje en la plaza, pero nadie le escuchaba. Alguien le dijo: "¿por qué pierdes tu tiempo, si nadie te hace caso?". Él contestó: "No importa, por lo menos el lanzar al viento mi mensaje me sirve para mantenerme fiel a mis principios e impide que los demás me obliguen a pensar como ellos".

El mal existe, el espíritu del mal sigue actuando. Jesús tiene que hacer frente a un espíritu inmundo, que grita "¿qué quieres de nosotros, Jesús Nazareno?" Son las fuerzas del mal, las fuerzas oscuras que hay dentro de nosotros las que se oponen al mensaje liberador de Jesús. "¿Has venido a acabar con nosotros?" Palabras duras que podían ser pronunciadas por aquellos fariseos y escribas que viven aferrados a los privilegios de la ley. No quieren que se hagan realidad las palabras de Isaías (Cap. 61, 1 ss.): "el Espíritu del Señor está sobre mí, porque me ungió para evangelizar a los pobres; me envió a predicar a los cautivos la libertad, a los ciegos la recuperación de la vista; para poner en libertad a los oprimidos, para anunciar un año de gracia del Señor". Un buen programa para todos en estos días no fáciles. Es la victoria frente a las tuerzas del mal. En aquellos tiempos llamaban endemoniados a personas que simplemente sufrían ataques de epilepsia u otras enfermedades mentales. Pero hoy como ayer podemos ver las consecuencias que produce en nuestro mundo el pecado: muertes prematuras de personas inocentes, hambre, guerra, atentados terroristas, intolerancia religiosa, Sn Marcos nos presenta la victoria de Jesús. Pero hace falta que nosotros estemos dispuestos a cola-

borar con Él en esta lucha.

From Our Tradition Treasures This is the year of St. Paul, and so one of the most visited churches of Rome is also one of the most beautiful: the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls. Like so many other churches, it was founded by the master-builder (or financier) Emperor Constantine about the year 315. Paul was martyred outside the walls of the City of Rome at a place called Tre Fontaine, probably on June 29, in the year 65, perhaps the first anniversary of St. Peter's crucifixion. Christians buried him in a quiet place about two miles away, and visited to pray. Constantine was running low on bricks, apparently, because the first church was tiny. In 386 it was demolished and today's basilica begun. This vast and towering space looks much the same today as it did in the fourth century. The centuries have not been kind to ancient Rome, but until the early 1800s St. Paul Outside the Walls survived beautifully, perhaps because it has been assigned for nearly a thousand years to Benedictine monks. It was therefore a vibrant place of daily prayer even through the centuries when Rome was a poor and nearly abandoned city. In 1823 a great fire resulted from a botched repair job to lead on the roof, and St. Paul's was destroyed. It is said that the whole world contributed to its restoration. Even the Russian czar and the vicerov of Egypt gave alabaster, malachite, and lapis lazuli for the pillars and the tabernacle. Several of the precious mosaics were able to be restored, bringing the ancient basilica back to life. One of the great treasures of the basilica is a set of prison chains, said to have been worn by the Apostle in the last days before his martyrdom. Unlike other Roman churches, St. Paul's stands in a gardenlike suburban neighborhood, surrounded by stately palm trees, gardens, and parks.
