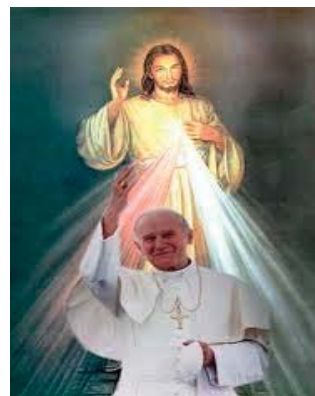
Parking At Easter

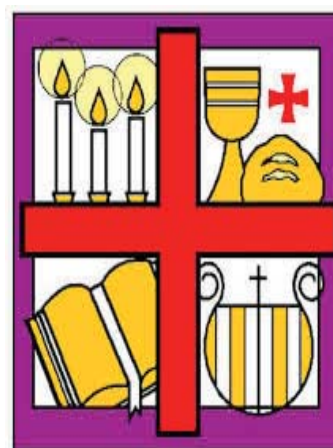


Divine Mercy Sunday

LA PAZ Y EL AMOR DE JESÚS

Domingo de Ramos, o domingo de pasión, Jesús quiso dejar claro que era pacífico. Entró en Jerusalén sobre un borriquillo y no a lomos de un impetuoso caballo blanco, rodeado de su guardia de honor. El cortejo de Jesús era festivo y propio de una romería. Las gentes le saludaban con ramos de olivo –señal de paz– y palmas. Y, desde luego, fue un gran éxito. Y si bien a las fuerzas de ocupación romana el asunto no les importó nada, no ocurrió así con el conjunto de las autoridades religiosas de Israel, que entendieron perfectamente que esa entrada era religiosa y que añadía un talante de paz y de fiesta muy deseado por el pueblo, pero odiado por el sistema oficial del Templo, ya que era todo un cambio. Y fue esa entrada triunfal lo que precipitó la persecución y muerte de Jesús.

En tiempo de Jesús cualquier problema de orden público era dominado enseguida con enorme dureza. Por el contrario los actos de contenido religioso –procesiones, romerías con cantos y las típicas subidas al templo— no producían inquietud alguna y dejaban que se desarrollasen, aunque algunas veces produjeran algún tumulto por la multitud que participa en ellas. Los militares romanos ya sabían lo que se traían entre manos y desde luego no hubieran permitido nada parecido a un ataque revolucionario. Otros tratadistas del mismo tinte revolucionario relacionaron también la actitud guerrillera de Jesús con la expulsión de los mercaderes del Templo.

La Iglesia y su liturgia –que derrochan gran sabiduría—han puesto en la misa de hoy ese relato completo de la Pasión de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo para que –digámoslo así—no haya duda sobre que celebramos hoy. Por eso, la liturgia tiene una lectura de júbilo, asociada a la procesión de Ramos y el relato íntegro de la Pasión. En este ciclo B hemos escuchado la Pasión según San Marcos que nos ofrece el testimonio nítido de la voluntad salvadora universal de Dios y de su amor representado en el sacrificio y posterior victoria de Cristo Jesús. Estarás de acuerdo conmigo que esta lectura en conjunto emociona y deja el alma perfectamente preparada para vivir la Semana Santa de la que el Domingo de Ramos es pórtico “físico” e inicio “psicológico”. Pensemos, ahora, pues en la paz que nos trae Jesucristo y en su talante de hombre pacífico.

La paz de Jesús se verá reflejada horas después en su retirada, en su marcha a Betania para descansar con sus amigos, Marta, María y Lázaro. Ante su éxito –y en términos estrictamente religiosos—Jesús podría haber pedido a los Sumos Sacerdotes y Senadores “que le tuvieran en cuenta” dentro de la “religión oficial”. Y quien sabe si esa imposible pretensión de Jesús –fue una de las tentaciones de Satanás en el desierto—de “oficializar” su mesianismo hubiera tenido éxito. Pero tanto Jesús como los líderes religiosos de Israel sabían que eso era imposible. Jesús pedía la vuelta a la religión original de Amor que el Padre esperaba. Los fariseos y saduceos alimentaban un sistema social, político y con formas religiosas, que nada tenía que ver con la misión de Jesús de Nazaret. Por eso, llegada la tarde, Jesús se retiró a Betania a esperar el desenlace de su Misión.

Por eso es importante hoy, tras la bendición alegre de los ramos, leer y meditar íntegra la Pasión de nuestro Maestro. Es difícil no sobrecogerse con el relato de Marcos de la Pasión. Concreto, directo, certero y muy claro. No es posible desviar la atención de lo que está ocurriendo. Y ese drama de Jerusalén, aunque sepamos que trajo nuestra salvación, todavía duele y aún resulta difícil admitir el sufrimiento de Cristo. Resuena el eco de ese sufrimiento en toda la Historia universal. Y fue por nosotros. Jesús es paz, Jesús es amor. Jesús supo vivir el dolor para que todos nosotros fuésemos más felices.

The Good Friday Pontifical Collection

Every year, each parish in the United States takes up a collection on Good Friday, as designated by the Holy Father. This collection helps support the work of the Franciscans in the Holy Land. The money is used to care for the people and places of the Holy Land. This collection keeps Christianity alive in this area made holy by the life, suffering, death and resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ



Guideline for Fast and Abstinence for Good Friday

Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics 14 years old and older must abstain

from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent. Fasting as explained by the U.S. bishops means partaking of only one full meal. Some food (not equaling another full meal) is permitted at breakfast and around midday or in the evening—depending on when a person chooses to eat the main or full meal. Abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not of eggs, milk products or condiments made of animal fat. Abstinence does not include meat juices and liquid foods made from meat. Thus, such foods as chicken broth, soups cooked or flavored with meat, meat gravies or sauces, as well as seasonings or condiments made from animal fat are not forbidden. So it is permissible to use margarine and lard. Even bacon drippings which contain little bits of meat may be poured over lettuce as seasoning. No one should be scrupulous in this regard; failure to observe individual days of penance is not considered serious. Moral theologians remind us that some people are excused from fasting and/or abstinence because of sickness or other reasons. The Code of Canon Law and our bishops remind us of other works and means of doing penance; prayer, acts of self-denial, almsgiving and works of personal charity. Attending Mass daily or several times a week, praying the rosary, making the way of the cross, attending the parish evening of prayer service, teaching the illiterate to read, reading to the blind, helping at a soup kitchen, visiting the sick and shut-in and relieving an overworked mother by baby-sitting—all of these can be even more meaningful and demanding than simply abstaining from meat on Friday

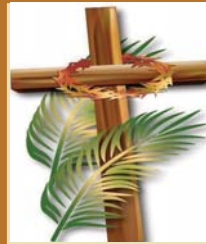
