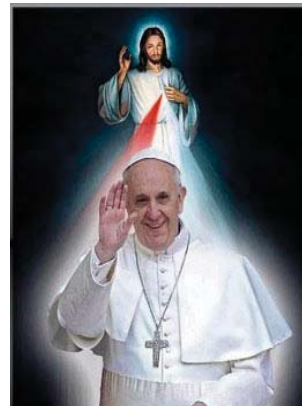

Divine Mercy Sunday

Saint John Paul II named the Second Sunday of Easter "Sunday of Divine Mercy" in response to Saint Faustina Kowalska's Divine Mercy devotion, which offered spiritual comfort to hearts worldwide. But Francis challenges us to make that comfort we receive a gift we gladly

share: "We are called to show mercy because mercy has first been shown to us." The clearest expression of merciful love, says Francis, is pardoning others. "At times how hard it seems to forgive!" he acknowledges. "And yet pardon is the instrument placed into our fragile hands to attain serenity of heart" (*Misericordiae Vultus*, 9). The necessary condition for living joyfully? "To let go of anger, wrath, violence, and revenge." May Divine Mercy Sunday in this Jubilee Year of Mercy remind us that Jesus made mercy our life's ideal and a criterion for our faith's credibility: *"Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy"*



Do Not Be Afraid

Did you notice? Today is called the "Second Sunday of

Easter," not the "First Sunday after Easter." Our celebration of Easter is not over. These Sundays of Easter continue to present the mystery of Jesus Christ's victory.

The readings begin with the "signs and wonders" abounding in those earliest days. Sick people lay in the street, hoping that at least Peter's "shadow might fall on one or another of them." Then, in a powerful passage from the book of Revelation, the visionary falls down "as though dead" upon seeing the victorious Christ. But Christ extends a gentle touch: "Do not be afraid . . . once I was dead, but now I am alive forever."

In the Gospel, that same Christ appears and breathes on the disciples, and gently leads Thomas to believe. This Christ—more powerful than any evil force, victorious over death

VER NO ES NECESARIO PARA CREER

El relato de Juan no puede ser más sugerente e interpelador. Sólo cuando ven a Jesús resucitado en medio de ellos, el grupo de discípulos se transforma. Recuperan la paz, desaparecen sus miedos, se llenan de una alegría desconocida, notan el aliento de Jesús sobre ellos y abren las puertas porque se sienten enviados a vivir la misma misión que él había recibido del Padre.

La crisis actual de la Iglesia, sus miedos y su falta de vigor espiritual tienen su origen a un nivel profundo. Con frecuencia, la idea de la resurrección de Jesús y de su presencia en medio de nosotros es más una doctrina pensada y predicada, que una experiencia vivida.

Cristo resucitado está en el centro de la Iglesia, pero su presencia viva no está arraigada en nosotros, no está incorporada a la sustancia de nuestras comunidades, no nutre de ordinario nuestros proyectos. Tras veinte siglos de cristianismo, Jesús no es conocido ni comprendido en su originalidad. No es amado ni seguido como lo fue por sus discípulos y discípulas.

Se nota enseguida cuando un grupo o una comunidad cristiana se siente como habitada por esa presencia invisible, pero real y activa de Cristo resucitado. No se contentan con seguir rutinariamente las directrices que regulan la vida eclesial. Poseen una sensibilidad especial para escuchar, buscar, recordar y aplicar el Evangelio de Jesús. Son los espacios más sanos y vivos de la Iglesia.

Nada ni nadie nos puede aportar hoy la fuerza, la alegría y la creatividad que necesitamos para enfrentarnos a una crisis sin precedentes, como puede hacerlo la presencia viva de Cristo resucitado. Privados de su vigor espiritual, no saldremos de nuestra pasividad casi innata, continuaremos con las puertas cerradas al mundo moderno, seguiremos haciendo «lo mandado», sin alegría ni convicción. ¿Dónde encontraremos la fuerza que necesitamos para recrear y reformar la Iglesia? Hemos de reaccionar. Necesitamos de Jesús más que nunca. Necesitamos vivir de su presencia viva, recordar en toda ocasión sus criterios y su Espíritu, repensar constantemente su vida, dejarle ser el inspirador de nuestra acción. Él nos puede transmitir más luz y más fuerza que nadie. Él está en medio de nosotros comunicándonos su paz, su alegría y su Espíritu. Que Jesús resucitado nos haga entender lo necesario que es seguirle y servirle en los demás. Paz y Bien.

PARA QUE CREAS

No sucede demasiado a menudo que el autor de uno de los libros de la Biblia se dirija directamente a nosotros para explicarnos por qué está escribiendo lo que está escribiendo. En la lectura del Evangelio de este domingo, que pertenece a la conclusión del Evangelio según san Juan, el autor nos dice que ha elegido escribir estos acontecimientos para que “crean que Jesús es el Mesías, el Hijo de Dios, y para que, creyendo, tengan vida en su Nombre” (20:31).

La carta de san Juan retoma esta idea diciendo que: “todo el que cree que Jesús es el Cristo ha nacido de Dios” (5:1); lo que llamaríamos “nacer de nuevo”. Nuestra lectura de los Hechos de los Apóstoles para este Segundo Domingo de Pascua nos muestra exactamente qué sucede cuando los creyentes nacen de nuevo por medio de la fe.

**LAS LLAGAS DE JESÚS**

En el Evangelio de Juan, Jesús se aparece dos veces a sus discípulos, y en esas apariciones Jesús les muestra las llagas de su crucifixión. De hecho, Tomás las toca. Las llagas de Jesús no desaparecieron después de su resurrección. Con eso, Jesús quiere que sus seguidores sepan que su sufrimiento, y los nuestros, sean parte de nuestro encuentro con él. Jesús reveló cómo Dios está presente en nuestro sufrimiento, uniéndose en nuestros momentos más dolorosos con consuelo y misericordia.

El sufrimiento es un gran misterio y no podemos explicar o justificar adecuadamente las muchas llagas que experimentamos a lo largo de la vida. Sin embargo, en la oración Dios puede abrir un camino por delante. El Espíritu Santo puede ofrecer sabiduría para percibir cuándo o cómo nuestros sufrimientos hacen posible la sanación o la esperanza para otros y para nosotros mismos. Cuando entramos en este misterio seguimos a Jesús, quien confió radicalmente en Dios para transformar sus sufrimientos a una nueva vida.

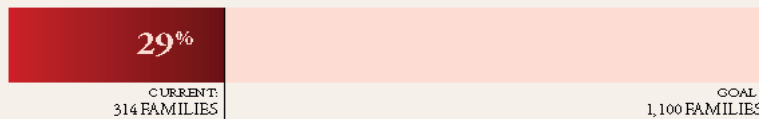

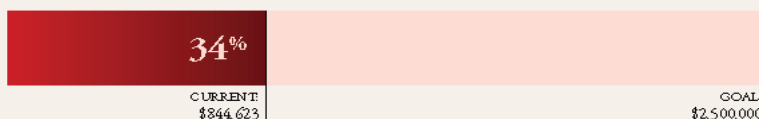
