

### Pentecost


The roots of today's "birthday of the Church" are in an ancient Jewish festival of springtime harvest, seven weeks after Passover. Now, seven weeks after Easter, our great fifty days of rejoicing come to an end. In the

countries where the Church first came to life, this is a time of harvest, and the first fruits appear: apricots and lemons, cherries and strawberries. Even in our gardens, herbs are abundant and asparagus, that close relation of the Easter lily, comes fresh to our tables. The earth is laden with so much new life, and that has always been a sign to Christians of Easter's glory. Pentecost means "fifty" and our fifty days of Easter joy are complete. This Sunday is a day to savor the glory of Easter once more: picnics and cookouts, walks by the water, time in the garden—are all ways of extending the feast. Notice the paschal candle today, still burning during Mass. Our Easter celebration now complete, the candle will soon be moved to a place near the baptismal font, and be lighted at baptisms and funerals as a silent witness to Christ's abiding presence.

sick and those who mourn. Feel free to call on us if we may be of service to you in any way.




### RCIA The Way to Become Catholic

### THE FULLNESS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

*The church wakes up to an amazing message this morning. Look around and see who has been called. Listen to the voices of those who proclaim Jesus is Lord. You'll find no race of people left out; you'll find no language on earth unfit to proclaim the glory of God. We call Pentecost Sunday the "birthday of the church." In many ways, the church is still being born. Only when we all know the peace Jesus offered in today's Gospel will we really know the fullness of the Holy Spirit. St. Paul assures us in today's second reading that "all of us have been given to drink of the one Spirit." When we look around us in the church we should see everyone. But we don't. Not yet. What is holding us back from fully embracing the one Body of Christ? When will we see our differences as manifestations of the same Holy Spirit?*

## **EL ESPÍRITU SANTO, ES LA FUERZA PARA LA MISIÓN**

Con la fiesta de Pentecostés, finalizamos el tiempo pascual, pero no por eso es menos importante el tiempo litúrgico que sigue, muchas veces no somos conscientes de la actuación del Espíritu en nosotros. Quizá sea porque no le dejamos actuar....Da la sensación de que estamos como los discípulos antes de Pentecostés: decimos que creemos en Jesús, nos confesamos cristianos, pero vivimos apocados, con miedo o timidez, sin garra. Entonces nos refugiamos en nuestra fortaleza por miedo a salir al mundo. Pero la imagen que define mejor a la Iglesia no es la de la fortaleza, sino la de la tienda que se planta en medio del mundo. La primera lectura nos dice: "Se llenaron del Espíritu Santo". Y Cristo explica el sentido de su soplo: "Reciban el Espíritu Santo". Son gestos parecidos a los del Génesis cuando sobre el caos de la nada, sopla Dios su palabra omnipotente: "Hágase la Luz, háganse las cosas y fue la creación y vio Dios que todo era bueno". Pentecostés es un nuevo Génesis. Hoy nace el mundo nuevo, hoy el Espíritu de Dios se da en un don. Dicho el hombre que lo comprende porque en su corazón ya ha nacido la eternidad; porque en su corazón ya ha nacido la esperanza de un mundo mejor; porque no se dejará abrumar por los problemas históricos, políticos y sociales. Cada uno tiene sus dones, sus capacidades, que contribuyen al enriquecimiento de la comunidad. El Espíritu nos ayuda a vivir la riqueza de la comunión para ser mejores instrumentos en las manos de Dios en la construcción de un mundo mejor.

La Iglesia es pueblo de Dios. El texto de los Hechos dice que "estaban todos reunidos". No dice que estaban sólo los apóstoles, sino todos, es decir el conjunto de los discípulos, todos los que se proclamaban seguidores de Jesús. Por tanto, los dones del Espíritu lo reciben todos los cristianos, no sólo los que han recibido el orden ministerial. El Espíritu actúa en todo, aunque cada uno reciba un don y una función. A cada carisma o don corresponde un ministerio o servicio. Pero todos somos miembros del cuerpo de Cristo y hemos recibido la misma dignidad por el Bautismo. ¿Reconoces en ti el carisma que has recibido?, ¿sabes cuál es tu misión dentro de la Iglesia? En este momento de la historia más que nunca hay que reconocer la importancia de los ministerios laicales. La Iglesia debe tener una estructura circular y no piramidal. La Iglesia es pueblo de Dios.

Reconocer que Jesús es "el Señor". La fe es un don singular del Espíritu que nos hace reconocer en Jesús al Señor. La segunda lectura de hoy ha dicho una cosa que nos puede sorprender: "Nadie puede decir Jesús es Señor, si no es bajo la acción del Espíritu". Claro que materialmente cualquiera puede decir: "Jesús es Señor", pero debemos entenderlo como una profesión de convencimiento y como una profesión que nos lleve a adorar sólo a Jesús y no estar queriendo hacer adulterios en nuestro corazón, reconociendo a Jesús como Señor, pero en cambio viviendo de otros ídolos: el dinero, el aparentar, los materialismos de la tierra. Por eso, "Jesús es Señor" sólo lo puede decir el que tiene fe. Nadie puede decir "Jesús es el único Dios", "Jesús es el Señor" si no ha sido envuelto en el ropaje de la fe que nos da el Espíritu Santo.

Los dones del Espíritu hoy. El don de sabiduría nos capacita para distinguir la realidad de la fantasía y vivir en consecuencia. El sabio es aquel que encuentra el secreto de la felicidad: la vida según Cristo. La inteligencia nos ayuda a aceptar los cambios que se producen en la sociedad para el bien común. Tener una mente abierta es señal de inteligencia. El don de consejo nos lleva a indagar bajo lo visible para descubrir las causas ocultas y poder ayudar al que nos lo pide. La piedad nos protege del egoísmo y del materialismo. La ciencia nos marca una dirección consistente en nuestras vidas, nos ayuda a conocer cómo son las cosas. El temor de Dios, entendido en el buen sentido, es beneficioso y nos hace realizar obras buenas, como el niño que respeta a su querido padre y no quiere defraudarle. La fortaleza es necesaria para un verdadero amor, pues nos da valor para asumir un compromiso auténtico y maduro.




#### Did you Know?

Some signs of abuse are too obvious to hide. Unexplained bruises and injuries may indicate abuse at home, and children who are close to a victim may notice these injuries more quickly than an adult, because

they spend more time together. Children also share secrets with each other, and if a child is being abused, he/she may be more comfortable confiding in a close friend than an adult. ### *The Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit*

When you were confirmed in the Church, you were exposed to and probably memorized the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit. These gifts were freely given to you as a Temple of the Holy Spirit. Do you use them? Have you grown in them? Which gift do you need to grow in at this moment in your journey of life. As with all virtues – practice, practice and practice the virtue, until it becomes a part of your life.

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* presents the seven gifts as follows:

**Wisdom:** it is the capacity to love spiritual things more than material ones;

**Understanding:** in understanding, we comprehend how we need to live as followers of Christ. A person with understanding is not confused by the conflicting messages in our culture about the right way to live. The gift of understanding perfects a person's speculative reason in the apprehension of truth. It is the gift whereby self-evident principles are known, Aquinas writes;

**Counsel** (right judgment): with the gift of counsel/right judgment, we know the difference between right and wrong, and we choose to do what is right. A person with right judgment avoids sin and lives out the values taught by Jesus;

**Fortitude** (courage): with the gift of fortitude/courage, we overcome our fear and are willing to take risks as a follower of Jesus Christ. A person with courage is willing to stand up for what is right in the sight of God, even if it means accepting rejection, verbal abuse, or physical harm. The gift of courage allows people the firmness of mind that is required both in doing good and in enduring evil;

**Knowledge:** with the gift of knowledge, we understand the meaning of God. The gift of knowledge is more than an accumulation of facts;

**Piety** (reverence): with the gift of reverence, sometimes called piety, we have a deep sense of respect for God and the Church. A person with reverence recognizes our total reliance on God and comes before God with humility, trust, and love. Piety is the gift whereby, at the Holy Spirit's instigation, we pay worship and duty to God as our Father, Aquinas writes;

**Fear of the Lord** (wonder and awe): with the gift of fear of the Lord we are aware of the glory and majesty of God. A person with wonder and awe knows that God is the perfection of all we desire: perfect knowledge, perfect goodness, perfect power, and perfect love. This gift is described by Aquinas as a fear of separating oneself from God. He describes the gift as a "filial fear," like a child's fear of offending his father, rather than a "servile fear," that is, a fear of punishment. Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom (*Psalms 111:10 // Proverbs 1:7;9:10*) because it puts our mindset in correct location with respect to God: we are the finite, dependent creatures, and He is the infinite all powerful Creator.
