

that the two mothers got together to discuss these things (Luke 1:39-56.) Most likely, talking about their experiences helped them to believe what the angel had said. You might say Elizabeth prepared Mary to be the mother of the Savior. And years later John would help people prepare to accept Jesus as their Savior.

Now the Church has always taught that saints are not just admired, they are to be imitated. So how do we imitate John? Probably not by living in the desert and eating locusts and wild honey. Let's look at a few of the things John is known for and how we can learn from them.

John lived in the desert to prepare for his ministry. How do we prepare to serve the Lord? Have you ever gone on a retreat, not just because it was required by your school or job, but because you wanted to take time to be with the Lord? Many retreat houses have weekend retreats for those who can't take off work. The point of a retreat is not just to get away, but to learn how to pray or to deepen your prayer life.

As we learn to pray better, we get to know the Lord better. That brings us to the second way to imitate John: Lead others to Christ. We need to know the Lord to bring others to him. With the power of the Holy Spirit we received in the sacrament of Confirmation, we can give good examples of Christian love, share our faith, stand up for justice, and encourage others to grow in faith. Like John, we may also meet resistance, but we can be confident that the Lord will be with us always.

The birth of John is much like the birth of Jesus. Neither mother expected to be pregnant (Elizabeth was very old, Mary was not married.) Both were announced by an angel; both were given a name by the angel (Luke 1:13 and 1:31.) All who heard about the births were amazed (Luke 1:66 and 2:18.) It should be no surprise

Treasures from Our Tradition

It's midsummer day! We have the advantage of celebrating one of the great hidden treasures of our liturgical calendar on a Sunday this year. There are only three "nativity" feasts on our calendar: for the Lord, the Blessed Mother (September 8), and today's birth of the Baptist. Today's date is anchored by the Annunciation (March 25), when Mary learns not only of her own child's advent, but of Elizabeth's child. We are exactly half a year away from Christmas Eve. There are strong traditions around this feast. Just as the winter solstice provides a rich vocabulary for Christmas, so does the abundance of light at midsummer inform this celebration. Just as at Christmas, a religious festival spills over into culture. As summer light reaches its peak, the sun-drenched zones of northern Europe see people staying up all night, lighting "St. John's fires" in the long summer twilight. Bonfires seem to be the unifying force in all these celebrations, kindled along the shores of the St. Lawrence in Quebec and Montreal, with harbor illuminations in France. You may be most interested in the custom in San Juan, Puerto Rico, the Baptist's own city. People there will leap into the sea between midnight and dawn to honor John. Why not find your way to a pool, a lake, or a sandy beach today and plunge in to recall your baptism? It's a tradition!

TODOS NACEMOS CON UNA MISIÓN

Este año coincide que esta fiesta importante cae en domingo, así es que todos celebramos este día del Señor recordando a San Juan Bautista, el que tuvo la misión de anunciar la presencia del Mesías en la tierra, el último de los profetas del Antiguo Testamento y el primero del Nuevo Testamento. Y hemos leído y escuchado este evangelio, y dice, escribió en una tablilla: "Juan es su nombre". En el mundo judío el nombre de una persona quería indicar el destino y la misión con la que esa persona había venido al mundo. Todas las personas, pensaban, somos enviadas al mundo por Dios con una misión. No nacemos para nada, nacemos para cumplir la misión que Dios nos ha encomendado. En este sentido, podemos decir que nuestra misión es nuestra vocación: Dios nos ha llamado a la vida para cumplir una misión determinada. Todos tenemos vocación para algo; todos estamos llamados a la vida para algo. En el caso de la fiesta que hoy celebramos el nombre de Juan se refiere a la misericordia de Dios con Zacarías e Isabel, al concederles el favor de engendrar un niño cuando ellos ya eran ancianos. El nombre de Juan significa: Dios ha mostrado su favor, Dios es misericordioso, Dios se ha apiadado. Como sabemos, la misión de Juan, su vocación, fue la de ser precursor de Jesús, del Mesías, y Juan Bautista cumplió su misión con fidelidad y entrega, fue fiel a la vocación que Dios le había dado. El ejemplo de San Juan Bautista, desde su nacimiento hasta su muerte, debe incitarnos a nosotros a descubrir nuestra vocación y a ser fieles a ella. En nuestro caso, nuestros nombres no han querido indicar, en su origen, la misión o la vocación con la que Dios nos ha traído al mundo. Generalmente, a muchos de nosotros nos eligieron nuestro nombre por motivos familiares, o por el santo del día. Pero todos nosotros hemos nacido con una misión bajo el brazo. Descubrir esta misión desde pequeños es una tarea importantísima para el futuro desarrollo de nuestra personalidad. Y más importante aún es ser fieles a la misión o vocación que con la que Dios nos ha traído al mundo. No es necesario pensar que nuestra misión tenga que ser algo grandioso o socialmente importante, es suficiente con que sea importante para nosotros y buena para los demás. Todos estamos llamados a colaborar en la construcción de una sociedad más justa y más buena; esa ya es una misión digna e importantísima, esforzémonos en ser fieles a ella. Esta será una buena manera de celebrar con dignidad la fiesta de la natividad de San Juan Bautista.

El Señor me llamó; en las entrañas maternas pronunció mi nombre. Este texto pertenece al segundo canto del profeta Isaías sobre el "Siervo de Yahveh". Aunque los que se dedican a estudiar estos temas no acaban de ponerse de acuerdo sobre la identificación del "Siervo de Yahveh", nosotros, los cristianos, hemos querido ver reflejada en este canto la figura de Jesús de Nazaret. Él fue el que, fiel a la misión que el Padre le había encomendado, se convirtió en "luz de las naciones, para que la salvación de Dios alcanzara hasta el confín de la tierra". Aquí vemos cómo ya, en tiempos del profeta Isaías, se hablaba de la salvación de Dios no sólo para el pueblo de Israel, sino para todo el mundo. Nuestra religión es católica, universal, y nuestra misión, nuestra vocación, es ser mensajeros de la universalidad de la misericordia y del amor de Dios para todas las personas. Para eso pronunció el Señor nuestro nombre cuando aún estábamos en las entrañas maternas: para predicar, con nuestra palabra y con nuestro ejemplo, el evangelio de una salvación católica y universal, el evangelio de Jesús de Nazaret.

Juan predicó a todo Israel un bautismo de conversión. Como del bautismo de Juan ya hemos hablado en otros momentos del calendario litúrgico, nos basta ahora animarnos mutuamente a llevar a cabo la perfección de nuestro bautismo, un bautismo que no fue sólo de conversión, sino de gracia y de Espíritu Santo. Es por eso que hay diferencia nuestro bautismo es para nuestra salvación pues nosotros mismos con nuestras acciones iremos caminando a la Salvación que anuncio Juan el Bautista. Su bautismo fue conversión, el de nosotros implica siempre conversión para no perder la gracia que hemos recibido en nuestro bautismo. Es una oportunidad para renovar nuestro bautismo hoy, y reunirnos con nuestras familias y renovar ese compromiso en la oración, la paz, la misericordia, el amor, comprensión, ayuda mutua. Es tiempo de reconocer que Dios no ha amado y ama tanto que no nos ha dejado solos nunca. Bendigamos a Dios con nuestros actos en este día que recordamos nuestros bautismos.

El que prepara el camino. Cuando recordamos a un personaje importante en la historia de la salvación se suele celebrar el día de su muerte. En algún caso celebramos su nacimiento a una nueva vida espiritual --conversión--, como es el caso de San Pablo, o San Agustín. Sólo en el caso de Juan "el Bautista" celebramos su llegada a este mundo. Al celebrar la natividad de San Juan Bautista, coincidiendo con la llegada del verano, la Iglesia quiere subrayar la trascendencia del "Precursor" en la preparación del "camino de Señor". Franciscan Vietnam Mission Appeal



Please welcome Fr. Kevin Schindler - McGraw OFM Conv, from the Province of St. Joseph of Cupertino in Arroyo Grande. Fr. Kevin is here to ask

for your help and support for the Franciscan Vietnam Mission. The apostolic life of the friars in Vietnam focuses principally on the corporal works of mercy. In the Red River Delta area in the north, the friars minister both to the rural poor of Thai Binh Province and especially to elderly leprosy patients in Văn Môn Village. In the south, the friars have created the Bread of Saint Anthony program which assists poor families — often headed by single mothers — with basic necessities: food, clothing and school supplies for the children. On weekends, the Conventional Franciscan student friars who study philosophy and theology at either the Franciscan Institute of Saigon or the Centrum Dominicanum Studiorum bring meals to the sick in Thủ Đức Hospital in the metro-Saigon megalopolis. 





Fr. Casimir Michael Cypher OFM Conv. is the first U.S. citizen to die by violence for the Catholic faith in Latin America during our century. Fr. Casimir was a Conventual Franciscan, Associate Pastor at Our Lady of Guadalupe Church and a Missionary in Honduras, Central America, in the 1970's. His death was very similar to the death of Jesus. He too was stripped down, publicly humiliated, tortured and killed. The date of martyrdom is June 25, 1975. Fr. Casimir was 34 years old. A Martyr is a witness to the truth of the faith, in which the martyr endures even death to be faithful to Christ. Fr. Casimir Cypher has not been recognized as an official martyr of the Church. Fr. Casimir is our martyr. You can read more about Fr. Casimir in a book entitled "*Man of Peace*" by Fr. Anselm Romb, OFM Conv.

This is one of many meditations by Father Casimir Cypher:

"What is important is not that we wait for a revelation in some book or in some saying, but take the revelation we have in our everyday life. And the revelation in our everyday life is to use the talents God gave us. Lazarus had no 'talents' — but what he was, he was. And that was all."

"There is beauty in life if we only worry about living completely and just being truly what God meant us to be. We miss it when we worry about not being really great, about accomplishing things we cannot accomplish. When we want God to make us greater than we are, we become smaller, because we neglect what we have and what we are already."

"Remember this Gospel. It is a sort of warning: Don't look too far into the future. When you look into eternity, don't look on forever; you will stumble over your own life. Look for eternity in those who are near you right now. For eternity begins today; it begins this moment. It begins right NOW!"
