3. Read the story of the death of St. Francis




### *Prayer of the Holy Rosary*

### *The Seal of the Franciscan Order*

The seal of the Franciscan Order depicts two arms placed over the cross of Christ. The bare arm of Jesus on the cross; the robed arm represents the arm of St. Francis of Assisi.

The placement of both arms together represents St. Francis' ardent desire to more fully unite himself with the love and sufferings of Christ. Two years before he died at the age of 44, after a night of prayer, St. Francis had a vision of a winged seraph nailed to a cross; he also felt intense stabs of pain in his hands, feet and side. Afterwards he discovered that his body was permanently marked with the five wounds of Christ crucified, called the Stigmata.

## **JESUS Y EL EVANGELIO INCLUYEN, NO EXCLUYEN A NADIE**

Este domingo tenemos la invitación de Jesús a predicar todos sin ninguna distinción y hacerlo de diferente manera, no hay que apropiarse del espíritu. El relato del Libro de los Números enseña que son muy diversas las actuaciones del Espíritu. Una de ellas es hablar en lenguas. Otra, más importante, es el haber recibido el encargo de dirigir y enseñar al pueblo de Dios. Desde Moisés, representante de Dios (que no hablaba en lenguas ni profetizaba con trances), el Espíritu se derrama sobre los inspirados. No siempre Dios comunica su espíritu por los canales oficiales. El Espíritu es soberano por encima de las instituciones. El carisma no debe ser rechazado por la autoridad. El presente pasaje de los Números confiere un carácter sagrado al origen de la institución de los ancianos, fundando así la importancia que tuvo siempre tanto religiosa como política. Los celos de Josué anticipan la misma actitud de los discípulos de Jesús frente al exorcista que arrojaba demonios sin ser de su grupo (evangelio de hoy). La gran tentación de la autoridad religiosa ha sido siempre monopolizar el Espíritu, pero el Espíritu se comunica a quien quiere y como quiere. Los que mandan no deberían estar celosos de que el pueblo profetice alguna vez; más bien debiera tomar nota de lo que dice Pablo a los obispos: "No apaguéis el Espíritu".

En algunos libros del Antiguo Testamento las riquezas se presentan como una señal de las bendiciones divinas. Se valoran las riquezas como posibilidad de practicar la "justicia" haciendo sacrificios a Dios. Pero la Biblia condena unánimemente el abuso de los ricos, la ambición desmedida y la explotación de los pobres. Además, los profetas han visto en la riqueza una fuente de injusticia. Para los evangelistas la riqueza aparece como un serio obstáculo que impide la entrada en el Reino de Dios. Es actual lo que dice Santiago. Los que viven bien deben su bienestar a que dos mil millones de personas viven en la miseria. La defensa de sus privilegios trae cada año como consecuencia inevitable la muerte injusta de millones de personas por hambre, represión y guerras. Los países ricos son incapaces de acoger en su tierra a los que huyen de la miseria o de la guerra. El evangelio, que es Buena Noticia para los pobres, se convierte en mala noticia para los ricos. Sin embargo, los ricos siguen acaparando riquezas sin caer en la cuenta de que el juicio de Dios es inminente. La retención del jornal es aquí sólo un botón de muestra de la explotación y de la injusticia de los ricos. Claramente lo expone la Doctrina Social de la Iglesia, la gran ignorada. Sarcásticamente, el autor dice a estos ricos que son como los cerdos que se ceban para la matanza.

No rechazar a los pequeños en la fe. Las palabras de Jesús en el evangelio van dirigidas contra esa determinada concepción de la autoridad como control, como monopolio exclusivo y excluyente. Hay aquí un canto en favor de los "pequeños" que creen en Jesús. Poco estimados, más ignorantes o débiles en la fe, jamás hay que hacerles tropezar (escandalizar). Estos pequeños pueden ser en la comunidad los que necesiten ser ayudados con cariño y paciencia para poder evolucionar sin desconcertar su fe. Pero también los que sufren la tentación de abandonar la Iglesia por la lentitud de ésta en renovarse. Todo el que se hace discípulo de Jesús y aún no ha llegado a una fe adulta es aun pequeño. Y el que aparta de su camino a uno de estos pequeñuelos es un homicida, ya que les impide llegar a la verdadera vida. "Escándalo" es la piedra que nos hace tropezar, el impedimento que se encuentra en el camino. La tentación nunca procede exclusivamente de fuera; de ahí que el hombre deba procurar también no escandalizarse a sí mismo. Y esto no es posible si uno no lucha contra sus propias inclinaciones y no toma medidas negándose a sí mismo.

Cristianos anónimos. También en nuestros días hay muchos hombres que exorcizan el mal y la injusticia de nuestra sociedad y, con todo, no son expresamente cristianos, éstos son de los nuestros aunque no sean "de los nuestros", pues es claro que no están contra nosotros. Son los "cristianos anónimos", muchas personas solidarias e implicadas en organizaciones humanitarias que luchan denodadamente contra la exclusión que sufren millones de personas en nuestro mundo. No les impidamos actuar, sumemos nuestras fuerzas a las suyas, nuestros proyectos a los suyos, para hacer un mundo más humano. También ellos colaboran a la extensión del Reino de Dios, la "civilización del amor" y de la paz de la Justicia y del bien común. Hagámoslo posible nosotros. Paz y Bien.

### In The Middle




