

ENTRÓ COMO REDENTOR Y SALIÓ CRUCIFICADO



Domingo de Ramos, hemos llegado al inicio de la Semana de las Semanas, iniciamos recordando que todo el mundo quería hacer a Jesús Rey, pero no sabían a qué tipo de reinado querían llevarlo, pero el tiempo viene a hablar y nos enseña lo que sucedió y lo que sucede, la traición, el olvido, el miedo, la euforia, los intereses personales todo eso entra en juego en este misterio tan grande que llevamos en nuestras vidas como Iglesia. Bendito el que viene en nombre del Señor. Santa: gritando entusiasmados la llegada del que viene en nombre del Señor, dando vivas al Altísimo. El que grita es el pueblo sencillo, la gente pobre que espera y desea la llegada de un futuro mejor, de un reino nuevo como el que predica este profeta de Galilea. El domingo de Ramos siempre ha tenido en la tradición católica un aire de fiesta, de entusiasmo, de alegre fe y esperanza cristiana.

A Jesús lo perciben y percibimos de muchas formas, "Veían a Jesús como a un redentor, como un liberador, como alguien más poderoso y más santo que los jefes políticos y religiosos que tenían. Y querían que este profeta les librara ya, anulando poderosa y milagrosamente a la gente que se le oponía. Por eso se desanimaron tan pronto, cuando vieron que este profeta era llevado, vencido y ajusticiado, por los poderosos de siempre. A muchos de nosotros puede pasarnos hoy lo mismo que pasó a la gente senci-

lla del tiempo de Jesús. Queremos que alguien nos arregle de un plumazo la situación de crisis por la que estamos pasando; queremos que nos arreglen las cosas hoy y ya, como por arte de magia, sin que nosotros tengamos que poner algo, o mucho, por nuestra parte. Y no es así: la redención sólo llega después de un tiempo duro de pasión. Si nos negamos a la pasión, estamos renunciando a la redención. Estoy hablando en sentido cristiano, claro.

Ellos gritaron más fuerte: ¡crucifícalo! Los que gritaban ahora eran los mismos que le aclamaron cuando entraba en Jerusalén. ¿Por qué lo hacían? El texto evangélico dice que porque los sumos sacerdotes habían soliviantado a la gente. Podríamos decir que el pueblo, las masas, eran entonces más fácilmente manejables y manipulables de lo que son ahora. Porque entonces la gente, el pueblo sencillo, no sabía ni leer, ni escribir. Pero no conviene exagerar las diferencias. Ahora, como entonces, la gente prefiere creer al que le promete un futuro mejor, más rápido, y con el menor sacrificio posible. Todos queremos que llegue cuanto antes el reino de Dios, un reino de justicia, de amor y de paz. Pero no queremos andar el camino propuesto por Cristo para llegar a él, el camino de las Bienaventuranzas. Dejamos que otros sean los pobres, los mansos, los que luchan por la justicia, los que perdonan, los que son generosos en amar a todos, preferentemente a los más necesitados. Nosotros queremos primero el éxito, el dinero, las satisfacciones materiales, el poder político y económico; para nosotros eso es lo primero y urgente; el camino de las bienaventuranzas puede esperar. Y por eso, al que nos pide humildad, fortaleza en la adversidad, lucha contra la injusticia, corazón limpio y un amor generoso y sacrificado a Dios y al prójimo le volvemos la espalda. Y dejamos que crucifiquen al Cristo que predica amor y perdón, lucha contra el mal y amor hasta la muerte. En este Domingo de Ramos hagamos el propósito de luchar siempre contra el mal y de ponernos a favor de tantas personas que, por amor a Dios y al prójimo, son capaces de exponer hasta su propia vida en defensa de los valores del evangelio de Jesús. Así lo hizo nuestro Salvador, el aclamado primero como Rey y crucificado después como reo.

La Iglesia y su liturgia –que derrochan gran sabiduría– han puesto en la misa de hoy ese relato completo de la Pasión de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo para que –digámoslo así—no haya duda sobre que celebramos hoy. Por eso, la liturgia tiene una lectura de júbilo, asociada a la procesión de Ramos y el relato íntegro de la Pasión. En este ciclo C hemos escuchado la Pasión según San Lucas que nos da la idea de que lo que se nos relata es testimonio de la voluntad salvadora universal de Dios y de su amor representado en el sacrificio y posterior victoria de Cristo Jesús. Estarán de acuerdo conmigo que esta lectura en conjunto emociona y deja el alma perfectamente preparada para vivir la Semana Santa –Semana Grande se decía antes–, de la que el Domingo de Ramos es pórtico "físico" e inicio "psicológico", Animados por este Dios de la vida y de la Esperanza, dispongámonos a participar como Iglesia, como parroquia, como familia. Dios espera siempre por nosotros aun cuando le aclamamos como Rey o no. Paz y Bien.

Guideline for Fast and Abstinence for Good Friday

Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics 14 years old and older must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent. Fasting as explained by the U.S. bishops means partaking of only one full meal. Some food (not equaling another full meal) is permitted at breakfast and around midday or in the eveningdepending on when a person chooses to eat the main or full meal. Abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not of eggs, milk products or condiments made of animal fat. Abstinence does not include meat juices and liquid foods made from meat. Thus, such foods as chicken broth, soups cooked or flavored with meat, meat gravies or sauces, as well as seasonings or condiments made from animal fat are not forbidden. So it is permissible to use margarine and lard. Even bacon drippings which contain little bits of meat may be poured over lettuce as seasoning. No one should be scrupulous in this regard; failure to observe individual days of penance is not considered serious. Moral theologians remind us that some people are excused from fasting and/or abstinence because of sickness or other reasons. The Code of Canon Law and our bishops remind us of other works and means of doing penance; prayer, acts of self-denial, almsgiving and works of personal charity. Attending Mass daily or several times a week, praying the rosary, making the way of the cross, attending the parish evening of prayer service, teaching the illiterate to read, reading to the blind, helping at a soup kitchen. visiting the sick and shut-in and relieving an overworked mother by baby-sitting—all of these can be even more meaningful and demanding than simply abstaining from meat on Friday.
