

It is highly recommended that all parishioners use the Sacrament of Reconciliation during Lent. It is good for the Soul, especially an honest examination of our conscious – where am Lat in my life and in my commitments.

- † Alms Giving helping others whether it be our time, talent or treasure. Doing the good that we can do, especially for the poor, each day.

Once again this year, we will be distributing Lenten Folders and Lenten Offering Cans. As in the previous years, your Lenten sacrifices are used to help the poor in Mission territories. Please use them each day as families and individuals to remind us of our need to care for the poor.

Tuesday Adoration

Lent is only a few days away. Instead of giving up something for Lent, how about coming to church on Tuesday's to spend some time with our Lord? Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament has been a tradition of the Catholic Church since the middle ages. It is an opportunity to converse with the Lord in a most intimate way. Adoration is where a consecrated host is place in the monstrance (Latin for "show-piece") and set upon the Altar for all to venerate. Often time, the adoration time is present with the Blessed Sacrament. The Adoration time is 4PM –7PM every Tuesday in the Church.

A Note from Fr. Paul on Health Concerns During Mass



THE START TO OUR LENTEN SEASON



AMOR: ¿QUÉ ES LO QUE JESÚS NOS QUIERE DECIR?

Este domingo nos habla sobre el amor, Jesús pide incluso amar a los enemigos, dar más de lo que nos requieren, ciertamente es preciso escuchar o leer de nuevo las lecturas, reflexionemos en ellas, es un mensaje asombroso que no ha pasado de moda es totalmente actual, sobre todo hoy que vemos tanto de injusto a nuestro alrededor, donde no se cuidan a los vulnerables, donde el migrante no es reconocido y amado en sus necesidades.

Nuestro mundo está lleno de personas indiferentes y somos aquellos que nos decimos cristianos, seguimos a Jesús, vamos a misa, al culto, a la asamblea. Pero somos incapaces de tocar en sus necesidades al otro. Lo dejamos de lado, no lo escuchamos, no lo vemos, menos abrazarlo o darle de comer. Que pasa? Debemos dejarnos inundar del Espíritu de Cristo y de su amor surgido desde lo más profundo de la divinidad.

El Sermón de la Montaña ha sembrado nuestra inquietud. Lo hace siempre, cada año, cuando se inicia por el sacerdote que proclama el Evangelio, la enumeración de las bienaventuranzas. Hemos oído muchos comentarios, numerosas homilías, hasta leído libros enteros dedicados a la gran proclama de Jesús de Nazaret. Pero seguimos sin entender. No son dichosos los que lloran, ni los que son perseguidos por causa de su creencia justa. No están contentos los pobres, más bien reniegan de su falta de buena suerte. ¿Y, entonces, que es lo que pasa? ¿Qué es lo que Jesús nos quiere decir?

Una preocupación que siempre me asalta es si, verdaderamente, nos tomamos en serio a Jesús de Nazaret y a su Evangelio. Hay muchas formas de obviar lo que está a la vista. Jesús nos dice: "Amen a los enemigos, hagan el bien a los que les aborrecen y recen por los que los persiguen y calumnian". Pero nosotros interpretamos esto como un algo figurado. O como máximo: aguantar a los que nos fastidian, a los que nos caen mal, aunque sean buenísimos. Pero no es eso. Tenemos que amar a nuestros enemigos y hemos de rezar por los que nos persiguen y nos calumnian. ¿Han visto algo más terrible que el efecto de una calumnia, las implicaciones de una mentira que una vez propagada por alguien nos hace mucho daño, provoca la desconfianza de los más cercanos, de la gente que más nos quiere? Sabemos que se nos ha calumniado para hacernos daño, mucho daño, para hundirnos, para perder nuestro trabajo y hasta nuestra familia. Y, sin embargo, Jesús me dice que tengo que rezar por quien me calumnia y desearle bien y paz. ¿Es tolerable? Parece que no, pero... Lo peor, desde luego, es no aceptar el consejo de Jesús por su imposibilidad y dejarlo todo pasar como si no fuera con nosotros. ¿No será mejor, en el caso de la duda, que le preguntemos al mismísimo Maestro lo que podemos hacer? Y que nos ayude con su fuerza y amor a seguir el camino que nos marca. La terrible, insisto, en dejarlo pasar y así no hacer sitio en nuestro corazón al mensaje de Jesús y dejarnos vencer por lo que nos rodea. Por un mundo de egoísmo y de desamor.

Y si la exigencia de Jesús para nosotros hoy es casi inabordable, decir que lo era mucho más para sus hermanos de religión de aquel entonces. Lo que entendemos como la Ley del Talión, y que aparece, por ejemplo, en el Antiguo en Éxodo 21:23-25, en Levítico 24:18-20 y en Deuteronomio 19:21, era una limitación en el exceso de venganza. Es decir, proporcionar la respuesta al mal recibido y no propasarse. Al final el "ojo por ojo" y el "diente por diente" obligaban a que el ofendido tuviera que respetar la vida de quien le había agredido, cosa que no era muy frecuente, la vida no valía mucho. Por eso los judíos se creían virtuosos en esa forma de contención. Pero Jesús no admite la devolución de la ofensa, ni siquiera limitando su efecto al, como decía, mal recibido. Todo el evangelio de Mateo de hoy y el correspondiente al domingo anterior es ir corrigiendo la ley mosaica para llevarla al principio del amor. Lo que queda por saber es si, incluso, los más cercanos, sus discípulos, entendían o aceptaban lo que Jesús decía. La lectura de todos los textos de los cuatro evangelistas nos demuestran que mucho, mucho, no le entendían; y que tuvo que llegar, primero, la Resurrección y, luego, la fuerza del Espíritu Santo para que comenzaran a hacer suya la doctrina de Jesús. Amen.

Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics 14 years old and older must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.

Fasting as explained by the U.S. bishops means partaking of only one full meal. Some food (not equaling another full meal) is permitted at breakfast and around midday or in the evening—depending on when a person chooses to eat the main or full meal. Abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not of eggs, milk products or condiments made of animal fat.

Abstinence does not include meat juices and liquid foods made from meat. Thus, such foods as chicken broth, soups cooked or flavored with meat, meat gravies or sauces, as well as seasonings or condiments made from animal fat are not forbidden. So it is permissible to use margarine and lard. Even bacon drippings which contain little bits of meat may be poured over lettuce as seasoning.

Each year in publishing the Lenten penance requirements, the U.S. bishops quote the teaching of the Holy Father concerning the seriousness of observing these days of penance. The obligation to do penance is a serious one; the obligation to observe, as a whole or "substantially," the days of penance is also serious.

But no one should be scrupulous in this regard; failure to observe individual days of penance is not considered serious. Moral theologians remind us that some people are excused from fasting and/or abstinence because of sickness or other reasons.

In his "Apostolic Constitution on Penance," Pope Paul VI did more than simply reorganize Church law concerning fast and abstinence. He reminded us of the divine law that each of us in our own way do penance. We must all turn from sin and make reparation to God for our sins. We must forgive and show love for one another just as we ask for God's love and forgiveness.

The Code of Canon Law and our bishops remind us of other works and means of doing penance: prayer, acts of self-denial, almsgiving and works of personal charity. Attending Mass daily or several times a week, praying the rosary, making the way of the cross, attending the parish evening prayer service, teaching the illiterate to read, reading to the blind, helping at a soup kitchen, visiting the sick and shut-ins and giving an overworked mother a break by baby-sitting—all of these can be even more meaningful and demanding than simply abstaining from meat on Friday.
