We have added TWO MASSES FOR ADVENT





Un mensaje del p. Carlos

Sabemos como Preparar, el camino del Señor?

Este segundo domingo nos invita a entrar en las implicaciones del desierto, eso es lo que Juan aprendió ahi, dejar de lado lo que no es eterno, a comprender a Dios desde la vida, aprender el lenguaje de la nada, la sencillez, humildad. Preparemos el camino al Señor, allanemos sus senderos. Juan el Bautista repetía las palabras del profeta Isaías, aplicadas ahora a la venida inmediata del Mesías: para poder

recibir bien al Mesías debíamos empezar por arreglar los caminos por los que el Mesías tiene que llegar hasta nosotros. Que los valles se levanten, es decir, que se encienda nuestra esperanza y eleve nuestros ánimos decaídos; que los montes y las colinas se abajen, es decir, que derribemos nuestro orgullo y pongamos nuestra esperanza en el Señor; allanemos en la estepa una calzada para nuestro Dios, es decir, arranquemos de nuestro interior los cardos, abrojos e inmundicias que hacen imposible la llegada de Dios hasta nosotros. Hagamos esto ahora, para que cuando venga el Señor nos encuentre preparados. Nuestro Dios quiere llegar a nosotros como un pastor bueno y misericordioso que nos apacienta, nos cuida, y nos lleva en sus brazos cuando nos ve enfermos y cansados.

Juan Bautista como profeta y encargado de preparar a la gente decía: detrás de mí viene el que puede más que yo, y yo no merezco agacharme para desatarle las sandalias. Juan daba ejemplo de lo que predicaba: vivía con austeridad y se reconocía humilde servidor del Mesías al que él anunciaba. Vivía su particular Adviento con una gran humildad y con una esperanza activa y consoladora. Era muy consciente de la importantísima misión que el Señor le había encomendado, pero esta conciencia de su misión no le llenaba de orgullo, sino de agradecida humildad. A los que acudían a él les decía que él solo podía bautizarles con agua, pero que el que iba a venir después de él les bautizaría con Espíritu Santo. No quería atribuirse méritos a sí mismo; el mérito y el honor eran todos para el Mesías al que él anunciaba. Él sólo era su mensajero y precursor. Todos y cada uno de nosotros, los que queremos seguir a Jesús, debemos vivir este tiempo de Adviento como activos mensajeros y entusiasmados precursores del Señor que quiere venir hasta nosotros. El Señor va a plantar su tienda en nuestro mundo y quiere que nosotros seamos mensajeros de su misericordiosa justicia, de su paz y de su amor. Solo viviendo así el Adviento, nos estaremos preparando dignamente para celebrar una auténtica Navidad cristiana.

Nosotros, confiados en la misericordia del Señor, esperamos un cielo nuevo y una tierra nueva, en que habite la justicia. Por tanto, queridos hermanos, mientras esperamos estos acontecimientos, procuremos que Dios os encuentre en paz con Él, inmaculada e irreprochable. Para poder vivir en un cielo nuevo y en una tierra nueva en la que habite la justicia, el apóstol san Pedro nos dice que deberemos vivir en este mundo llevando una vida santa e inmaculada, estando siempre en paz con Dios. A esto debemos aspirar también hoy todos los cristianos del siglo XXI: a hacer de nuestro mundo una tierra nueva, donde no reine la corrupción y la injusticia, sino la misericordia y la justicia de nuestro Dios. Así debemos vivir nuestro Adviento: purificándonos de todos nuestros defectos y pecados, para que, cuando llegue el Señor, nos encuentre puros y santos. Vivamos con animo gozoso la esperanza del Señor, la alegria de su encuentro. Amen.




